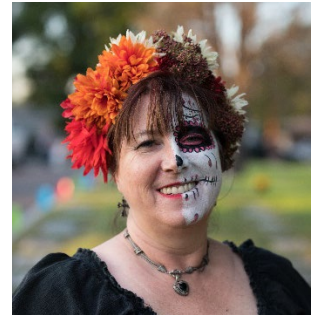
Dia de los Muertos Celebrations

Charlotte Van Steenberg, a survivor of a Japanese concentration camp, also read her moving poem titled "America's Gift" – a beautiful and poignant declaration of her gratitude for the liberty that can so easily be taken for granted. Also included in the program was a wreath presentation by our local city officials, special music by vocalist John Huntington, bagpipes by Jim Clements, and Taps was played on the bugle by Boy Scout Jeremy Mamaril.

American Heritage Girls Host 3rd Annual Wreaths Across America - Placing 1,159 Wreaths on U.S. Veterans' Graves

American Heritage Girls Troop 356, coordinated another inspiring Wreaths Across America Ceremony, and it just gets bigger and better every year. What started as a handful of volunteers gathered around the flagpole has now become a wonderful event for the cemetery, with well over 150 people in attendance.

We now have six groups selling wreaths for the Veterans at El Toro Memorial Park. Thanks to an incredibly generous sponsorship by the Elks Lodge of Mission Viejo-Saddleback Valley #2444, Wreaths Across America delivered 1,159 wreaths to honor our veterans. The ceremony was held on Saturday, December 14th at 9 a.m., and honored all branches of the military including those

who are prisoners of war or missing in action. Girls from the Troop escorted a veteran from each branch of the armed services who presented a wreath representing their branch of the military. Because the event, has grown so much, it was moved to the Old Section and a stage and canopy were provided by District Staff. Greg Rath who is the Mayor of Mission Viejo and a retired Marine Corps officer, and Jamie Camunas, the Elks Lodge President, both gave brief remarks.

Following the ceremony, which was conducted entirely by the girls in the Troop, all those in attendance worked to place wreaths on veterans' graves. As

each wreath was placed volunteers were encouraged to speak the veteran's name, thank them for their service, and say a prayer for the veteran's family. This year Wreaths Across America will place over 1.5 million wreaths, at over 1,400 locations across the United States, at sea, and on the beaches of Normandy. But the mission of Wreaths Across America is far more than simply gravesite decoration. Their purpose is threefold – to **REMEMBER** our fallen U.S. Veterans; to **HONOR** those who serve; and finally, to **TEACH** our children the value of freedom. The District would also like to acknowledge the efforts of Ashely Furniture for providing trucking and drivers to transport these wreaths to our cemetery. Groundskeeper Rigoberto Ramirez Retires After 30 Years

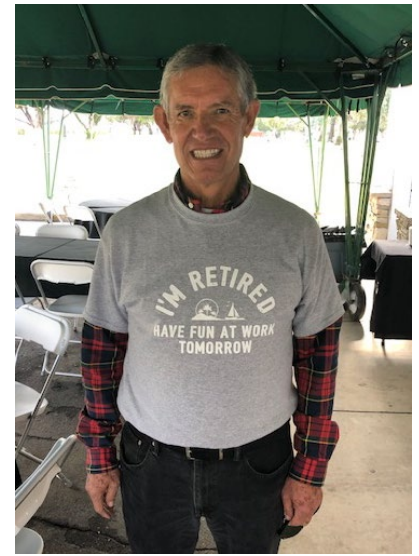

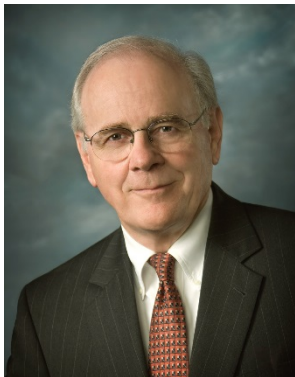
To mark his retirement, the District hosted a special luncheon on site that was attended by almost all of the groundskeepers from all three cemeteries, the cemetery managers, District

The District's 2018-19 Annual Audit Shows a Clean Report

While this time of year brings festive holiday celebrations, it also brings the annual financials for the District's Accounting staff. The Finance staff has been working with the District's external auditors, Eide Bailly, LLP over the last two months to complete on-site fieldwork and finalize the audit report of the District's finances. We have once again received an unqualified (or "clean") opinion by the audit firm which indicates a fair and accurate presentation of the financial statements for the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2019. In addition to assisting the auditors with their fieldwork, our Finance staff has been preparing the supplemental narratives and schedules to our Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR).

In FY 2017-18, the District opted to enhance our reporting and created a CAFR for the first time and submitted the

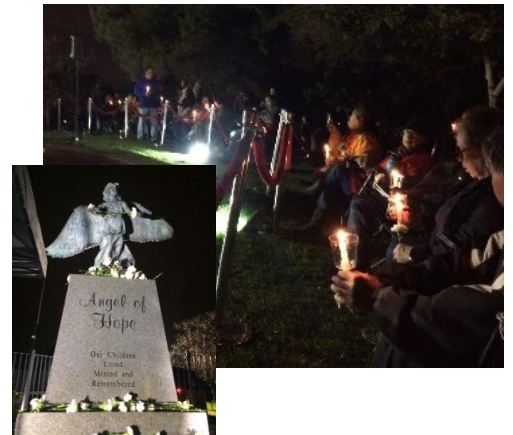
report to the Governmental Finance Officers Association (GFOA) CAFR award program for evaluation. We were notified in the spring of this year, that the District was recognized by GFOA with the annual "Certificate of Achievement of Excellence in Financial Reporting" for our first submission for this award program.

Right now, we are finalizing our FY 2018-19 CAFR for submission to the GFOA CAFR award program for a second consecutive year. We anticipate posting the 2018-19 final audit to the District website in January after the auditor's from Eide Bailly formally present the completed audit to the Trustees at the January Board Meeting.

18th Annual Angel of Hope Candlelight Service Held for Grieving Parents

Family members grieving the loss of a child were welcomed at the Angel of Hope statue at El Toro Memorial Park on Friday evening, Dec. 6th for a candlelight service. The Angel was modeled after a statue featured in the book, *The Christmas Box* about a mother who grieves the loss of her child at the base of an angel monument. Every year this program is held so families can come together for a time of remembrance to honor the lives of those lost too soon.

During the program Lisa Popper welcomed those in attendance and Ching Lim read an excerpt from *"The Little Prince"*. Tim McCalmont led the invocation. The keynote speaker was Courtney Ransom who delivered a powerful and deeply personal account of her experiences following the death of her teenage son. Mike Heddleston read a poem titled, "Danielle" which was written by his wife as a tribute to the daughter they lost. Lauren Flores's beautiful voice complimented the program as she sang two selections titled "I Will See You Again" and "Gone Too Soon" and then ended the program by leading the audience in the singing of "Amazing Grace". As always, the emotional heart of the program was the Flower Tribute, where families can come forward, speak the name of their loved one, and present white flowers in their memory at the Angel. Our thanks to all those who worked so hard to make this program possible.

"Longest Night" Memorial Service at Anaheim Cemetery Remembers the Homeless of Orange County



As darkness fell, attendees listened in the candlelight to the reading of names of the 207 people who had passed away on the streets of Orange County during 2019. The memorial wall pictured above, is a labor of love for Hope 4 Restoration Founder, Tim Houchen. It lists all 207 names and even features pictures of some of those who had passed.

The "Longest Night" is an event that recognizes National Homeless Persons Memorial Day and takes place in more than 175 cities across America each year on the winter solstice. Most of us see this as the shortest day of the year, but it is the longest night for persons experiencing homelessness.

The Orange County program has been sponsored by Hope 4 Restoration since 2014, and has been held at Anaheim Cemetery since 2017. Tim Houchen, who was homeless from 2011 to 2015, is the founder of Hope 4 Restoration and led the memorial service which took place on Dec. 21st from 4 to 6 p.m.

The event featured an invocation by Rev. Karen Stoyanovich of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Anaheim who stated that no human being should die without their life being noted or remembered and that our homeless neighbors should be honored for their courage and determination. Keynote Speaker, Susan B. Parks, who is the President and CEO of Orange County

United Way spoke about how a home changes everything and can even make the difference between life and death. She told the story of a young man who had aged out of foster care only to become homeless, but was able to secure housing through a United Way initiative.

There were also moving messages by Patrick Hogan who read a poem about his experiences while homeless. He stated that just because you die homeless, doesn't mean you are friendless or worthless. Another young woman named Katie shared her experiences about the recent loss of her father, who had died while homeless.

Special music for the program was also provided by a beautiful choir of about 30 members called the Solstice Singers, led by Brian Dehn. Vern Pat Nelson, Anne Marie Randle-Trejo, Elisha Martinez, Brian Dehn and the Solstice Singers ended the program with a 45-minute performance of "Songs of the Orange County Homeless."

Flower Removal and Holiday Schedule

Every Wednesday, groundskeepers remove and discard flowers and decorations throughout all three cemeteries. Families are encouraged to remove their flowers or decorations on Tuesday night; you can then place the flowers back on the space on Wednesday afternoon. Please remember that the District policy only allows for two items to be placed on gravesites. This includes the in-ground flower vase and one other item. If gravesites exceed the number of allowed items, staff may remove and discard the excess items. Please do not leave items of great monetary or sentimental value on gravesites as the District cannot prevent theft.

The District permits the allowed two items of flowers and/or decorations to be left on gravesites during holidays or for special occasions, such as anniversaries, birthdays and for new interments. Please come to the cemetery office and let us know that you have a special occasion and request that the flowers and decorations be left on the space. We do ask that you empty the vase and place fresh water in the container every four to five days to eliminate mosquito breeding sources, which can cause serious health issues. Your cooperation in this regard is greatly appreciated.

In honor of Valentines' Day , flowers may be placed on gravesites beginning on Thursday, February, 6th until Tuesday, February 25th.
