City of Santa Ana Improvement Project on Santa Clara Avenue

On March 2nd the City of Santa Ana began much needed street improvements along Santa Clara Avenue to make it safer for pedestrians and bicyclists. The city demolished the old curbs, widened the street to make room for a bike lane, installed new curbs and a gutter, and for the first time, a sidewalk was installed on that side of the street. Not only does this project greatly improve the aesthetics of the street view, it makes accessibility to the park easier and gives greater protection to staff mowing and trimming the grass in front of the cemetery. Temporary Vases Now Easy to Find at El Toro Memorial Park

If you have an in-ground flower vase, at one time or another you have probably arrived at the park with flowers to place, only to find that your in-ground vase is either completely covered by grass or hopelessly stuck.

Staff at El Toro are aware of the problem, but with the number of burials occurring, coupled with the thousands of in-ground vases to be maintained, it is an unfortunate fact that vases can get overgrown. Cemetery Manager Bud Bales, was brooding over this problem, when it occurred to him that perhaps a solution might be to make temporary vases more accessible to families.

For years, the District has offered temporary vases for families to use who either did not order an in-ground vase, or the vase they purchased has not been installed yet because a gravestone has not arrived. These

vases are available in the office. But this was no help for families visiting on a weekend when the office is closed, plus many people don't know vases are even available at the office.

That's when Mr. Bales envisioned a stand that would be easily recognizable and hold multiple vases for public use. With a little imagination, he came up with a design and with the help of Leadworker, Juan Lopez Bautista they built the first prototype. Now staff are busy building 20 of these vase stands at a cost of only \$67 per stand. The vase "trees" will be planted next to each water spicket in the park.

If you have an in-ground vase, and it has been a while since your last visit, please call El Toro's office at least a week ahead of your visit. You can request maintenance to ensure that your vase will be ready for use upon your arrival. And for all those still

needing a vase, temporary cone vases are now on the grounds and easy to find! Please take no more than two vases per gravesite. We appreciate your cooperation!

Santa Ana Section Marking and Speed Bump Painting Complete

Staff at Santa Ana Cemetery have been busy painting new section identifiers on the streets to make it easier for visitors to locate gravesites. They have also been repainting the speed bumps to improve visibility, as well as to clearly mark the handicap parking stalls that are located across from the cemetery office building.

New red curbs have also been painted at every intersection in the park. The red curbs extend out eight feet from each intersection and are meant to discourage visitors from parking right on the corners. When this occurs, other vehicles cannot turn and drivers become stuck. This is frustrating for everyone. Please abide by the red curbs and help keep traffic flowing smoothly in the cemetery. El Toro Memorial Park Is open for visitation, seven days a week, from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

> Cemetery Offices are open M-F 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. All offices are closed on the weekends and on holidays.

Flower Removal and Holiday Schedule

Every Wednesday, groundskeepers remove and discard flowers and decorations throughout all three cemeteries. Families are encouraged to remove their flowers and/or decorations on Tuesday night. You can then place the flowers back on the space on Thursday morning. Please remember that the District policy only allows for two items to be placed on gravesites. This includes the in-ground flower vase and one other item. If gravesites exceed the number of allowed items, staff may remove and discard the excess items. Please do not leave items of great monetary or sentimental value on gravesites as the District cannot prevent theft.

Throughout the year, various holidays are recognized with extended periods between full park clean-ups. During these times, we do ask that you empty the vase and place fresh water in the container every four to five days to eliminate mosquito breeding sources, which can cause serious health issues. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.



In honor of Independence Day, flowers may be placed on Thursday, June 29th and must be removed by Tuesday, July 18th. During these periods, light cleanup will still occur each Wednesday and only flowers that are obviously wilted will be removed.

Please be advised, during full park clean-ups everything on gravesites are discarded. Beginning July 19th there will be full park clean-ups every Wednesday through August 30th. Please be sure to remove items you do not want discarded before the cemetery closes on Tuesdays.
